What is the SOAP[®]?

Supplemental Offer and Acceptance Program

Connects unmatched applicants to unfilled residency positions

Some data....

2016:

- Over 25,000 PGY-1 positions in NRMP
- 1,097 unfilled positions in SOAP
 - Over 1100 US Seniors with ROL unmatched
 - 155 unfilled positions in Family Medicine
- **<u>NINE</u>** unmatched applicants for every unfilled position
- More than half of available positions are accepted in 1st round
- >600 US allopathic seniors with no position post-SOAP

- Starts Monday of Match week, 11am
- Majority of activity occurs on Days 1, 2 & 3, but SOAP[®] continues through Day 4 (Thursday)
- Match Day Friday March 17th

SOAP[®] Day 1

- Monday, March 13, 2017
- 11am:
 - Applicants find out they did not match
 - Programs find out if unfilled
 - List of unfilled programs distributed
- 2pm:
 - SOAP[®] applicants can start preparing and sending applications in ERAS
- 3pm:
 - Programs begin viewing SOAP® applications in ERAS
 - Interviews begin and continue through evening

SOAP[®] Day 2

Tuesday, March 14, 2017

- Interviews continue throughout the day
- 11:30am:
 - Programs begin creating SOAP[®] preference list in R3 system

SOAP[®] Day 3

Wednesday March 15, 2017

- Interviews continue in the morning
- 12:00pm: SOAP[®] Round 1, applicants receive offers
 - 2:00pm: Deadline to accept/reject
- 3:00pm: SOAP[®] Round 2 offers
 - 5:00pm: Deadline to accept/reject
- 5:05pm: List of Unfilled Programs updated in R3 system

SOAP[®] Day 4

Thursday March 16, 2017

- 9:00am: SOAP[®] Round 3, applicants receive offers
- 11:00am:
 - Deadline to accept/reject
 - SOAP[®] Ends

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Faculty Tasks in SOAP®

- Be a force of calm, reassurance, and support
- Know your institution:
 Where do students meet, who reaches out, etc.
- Write new LOR for student
- Career counseling/guidance
- Dean can add addendum to MSPE (as needed)

No contact with programs until they make contact, but <u>after</u> programs make contact, reach out and offer to speak to them!

Student Tasks in SOAP®

- Start a spreadsheet to keep track of programs applied to
 - Apply to the max: #45
 - Look at websites and take notes about program
- Work on revising Personal Statement
 - Can be shorter and more concise
 - Upload different versions with CLEAR titles into ERAS
- Go through LORs to decide if all still work
- Interview Prep

Prepare for Interviews

- What were you trying to match into and why do you think you did not match successfully?
- Why are you interested in our program?
- What experience or exposure do you have in your SOAP specialty?
- What are your career aspirations?
- What are your weaknesses in your residency application?
- What is your connection to this geographic area? What is your personal support system?
- Are you planning to re-enter the Match again next year?
- Prepare some questions you would like to ask the program.
- □ Close the interview with PLANS FOR NEXT STEPS

Case Studies

Questions to consider

- Who currently assists these students at your institution?
 - Are they the best fit?
- How would you advise the student?
 Yes/No apply for FM positions
- How can you assist the student?
 - Research programs, letters of rec, etc.



Who's at the table?

Pick a card!

- Student
- Clerkship Director and/or MSE Directors
- Mentors
- Advising Dean
- Department Chair
- Home institution Residency PD
- Residency PD with unfilled positions

Case 1:

Student applied to Family Medicine, received interviews, but did not match. His plan is to try for a position in FM through the SOAP[®].

Case 2:

Student applied to psychiatry, received interviews, but did not match. The plan is to try for a position in FM through the SOAP[®].

Case 3:

Student applied to dermatology, received interviews, but did not match. The plan is to try for a position in FM through the SOAP[®].

Case 4:

Student applied to OB/GYN, received interviews, but did not match. He is considering applying for a position in FM through the SOAP[®].

Common Themes

- Psychosocial issues are common!
- Distractions are everywhere
- FM spots have historically been available
- SOAP[®] is NOT a strategy
- Maintain professional integrity
- SOAP[®] is not the only option
- Prevention is KEY!
